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Presidents report

Victoria is a basket case and we are broke! The government and previous governments have said all our fishing licence money will always be ferried back into the industry. Every year the revenue that is collected from the sale of Recreational Fishing Licences (8 Million+) is paid into the Recreational Fishing Licence (RFL) Trust Account, and the funds are then used for projects and activities that improve recreational fishing in Victoria in many ways. Initially this was the case but then some sticky government fingers got in and funding was used to employ extra fisheries officers. Arguably this wasn't so



bad as we did benefit by reducing poaching and overfishing. So, has the government sacked the officers we were funding or the ones paid by the state government? I smell something here and the question needs to be asked. "Is the current government raiding the RFL Trust fund to pay off debt elsewhere?"

The Victorian government receives millions of dollars each year from the sale of recreational fishing licenses. These funds are used to improve recreational fishing in Victoria.


Pre-Meeting Dinner

Life Jackets 101

"We recommend" you and your passengers should wear a lifejacket at all times. It won't just save you a fine – it could save your life. The types of life jacket you must carry and wear depend on the type of boat and the waterway you are operating on.

Some basic rules:

The use of Life Jackets and Personal Floatation Devices (PFDs) is regulated in Victoria by the Marine Safety Act (2023) and are regulated by Safe Transport Victoria.

- Lifejackets will continue to be required to be worn on vessels up to and including 4.8 metres in length and in circumstances of heightened risk.
- For it to be considered as being 'worn' a lifejacket must be fastened and secured as intended by the manufacturer. When not being worn, a lifejacket of a specified type must still be carried onboard a vessel for each occupant.
- On powerboats over 12 metres in length, there is no compulsory requirement to wear a lifejacket at any time. However, an appropriate lifejacket must still be carried onboard for every occupant.
- Solo adults are considered to be boating alone and must comply with the heightened risk provisions which apply on powered boats up to 12m in length.
- Every child under 12 wears a lifejacket at all times. This includes when on 'hire and drive' vessels. Lifejackets with crotch straps are crucial – especially for children – as they prevent the lifejacket from slipping off and ensure it stays securely in place, offering reliable buoyancy and protection in water activities.
- Life jackets and other Personal Flotation Devices (PFD's) must comply with certain Australian Standards for the type of boat and the locations you are fishing. So check you are compliant. AS4758 will be the only accepted standard from July 2028. Other current standards include: AS1512 and ISO 12402

Types of Life Jackets:

- Type 1 Level 100 and over A lifejacket Type 1 provides a high level of buoyancy and keeps the wearer in a safe floating position. They are made in high visibility colours with reflective patches.
- Type 2 Level 50 A lifejacket Type 2 is a buoyancy vest. It provides less buoyancy than a lifejacket Type 1 but sufficient to keep you afloat.
- Type 3 Level 50S A lifejacket Type 3 is a buoyancy garment. It has similar buoyancy to a lifejacket Type 2 but is manufactured in a wide variety of colours and is shaped or equipped for particular activities.

Maintenance and Checking:

Like any bit of equipment on your boat – you need to maintain and check it regularly.

- Inflatable lifejackets need to be inspected and serviced periodically, in order to comply with the legislation.
- Buoyant lifejackets, such as foam lifejackets, should be self-inspected regularly. Check for mould, wear and tears.
- Get to know your lifejacket There are some simple checks that can be carried out regularly:
 - \circ ~ Look over the jacket for any signs of physical damage that has occurred during storage or use.
 - Make sure the indicator on inflatable lifejackets is green and that the CO2 cylinder is in good condition and screwed down tight on the 'O' ring
 - Check the lifejacket's fabric, flotation, zippers, buckles, waist belts and all fastenings for signs of excessive wear, cracking, fraying or anything to indicate possible loss of strength or flotation.

The basics on whiting. tackle. your normal trout or bream gear will do fine.

4to 5 kg line. No6 long shank hooks, and that basically covers it.
